# Participant Journey



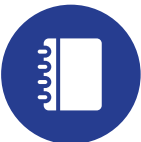
## 1. Review & sign the Informed Consent Form

The Informed Consent Form (ICF) explains the study and what you can expect in more detail. The study team will help review the information in the ICF and answer any questions about the study. You can discuss the information in the ICF with friends and family before you decide to participate. Your decision is your choice, but you must sign the ICF to give your consent before you receive any study assessments.



## 2. Confirm study requirements

During Screening, the study team will ask you questions about your tinnitus and perform several tests and assessments, including a physical examination of your ears and a hearing test.



## 3. Complete a daily diary

You will rate your tinnitus loudness and annoyance each day in your diary by ranking it along a scale. You will access this diary using an application on your smartphone or tablet.



## 4. Be randomly assigned to receive study drug or placebo

Once you have met the Screening requirements, you will be randomly assigned (like the flip of a coin) to receive an injection of the study drug or placebo. You have an equal chance of receiving each assignment.



## 5. Receive injection

You will be asked to lie down and stay very still. A trained medical professional will numb a part of your ear drum, insert a small needle into your middle ear, and inject the study drug or placebo. Afterward, you will be asked to rest. The procedure will take about 20 minutes to complete.



## 6. Complete Follow-up visits

You will visit the study clinic 4 additional times at monthly intervals so the study team can check your health, ask you questions about your tinnitus symptoms, and perform physical ear examinations and hearing tests.



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
